

Keep your dog under effective control to make sure it stays away from wildlife, livestock, horses and other people unless invited. You should:

- always keep your dog on a lead or in sight
- · keep on a lead unless confident your dog will return on command
- Dog poo bag it and bin it any public waste bin will do

There plenty of bins at various points around the field and we will be putting up signs in due course regarding these issues as a constant reminder.

Oh, it appears that I forgot to mention in my last article that the matting for the overflow car parking at the village hall was in fact funded entirely through a grant from the National Lottery Community Fund. We are very grateful for the two grants that we received this year, as they have enabled us to improve our facilities and celebrate the Jubilee with minimal impact on our accounts!



#### Letter from Jane Quinton

#### Another world.....

So how is your summer going? By now schools will have broken up and those eagerly anticipated summer holidays are being enjoyed (flights permitting!)



I hope everyone is managing to staying safe and cool – writing this as I am, on the weekend of the amber/red weather warnings that are forecasting temperatures expected to reach 40 degrees!

I was actually able to beat the holiday rush and enjoy a summer break in Cornwall at the end of June. It gave me the chance of experiencing not only a different world location wise, but also in an imaginary sense..... in that I immersed myself in a good book! Having heard excellent reviews about Richard Osman's first novel, I decided to enter into the world of the 'Thursday Murder Club'......and was instantly hooked! Having taken me just 3 days to read, I immediately searched out a local shop to buy the sequel. Because that's what a good book can do – whisk you away to another realm, drawing you in to a new group of people and surroundings and events, that you feel very quickly part of and invested in.

However, such new imaginary communities, as well as being a means of enjoyment and escapism, can actually present interesting, thought-provoking questions to real-life issues and situations. Such as in 'The Man who died Twice' (the second book of the 'Thursday Murder Club' series), in which two of the characters (Joyce and Ibrahim) discuss death. For Joyce, life is about happiness, whereas for Ibrahim, 'everything is about death', and in imparting their different perspectives to the other, Joyce ends up talking about everything being 'blue'!

Interesting though Joyce's argument is, one of the deeper truths of life is that nothing is indeed black and white...... except, I would advocate, that we are all born in the image of our Creator God, who loves each one of us more than we will ever imagine. Having put His love into each one of us He has given us a world that is not imaginary, nor black and white but gloriously vibrant – a world to feel part of and invested in, to look after and love.... every single part of it.

And so, whilst I now await the release of the third book in the 'Thursday Murder Club' series, I pray that whatever your plans be this summer, you might be blessed along the way.










#### **Pageturners**

#### Olive Again by Elizabeth Strout

We were first introduced to Olive in the book *Olive Kitteridge*, which like this one, is a novel of short stories. Elizabeth Strout created a character so vital, so funny, so exasperating and yet so winning that Olive lights up a story even when she is only glimpsed in the distance, a hand waved over her head in her signature gesture. Olive was in late middle age, and had no brakes, no filter. She said what she thought, without pausing to wonder how hurtful, or how wrong, she might be.



Ten years later we return to Olive's world in *Olive Again*, which, like its predecessor, is made up of interconnected stories. Olive still lives in the town of Crosby, Maine, which lies on a beautiful stretch of remote coast, as far north east as states in America go. It's just a place, but it matters to Olive, and so do its people.

This book, is about her coming of age. At the end of *Olive Kitteridge*, published 11 years ago, we left her in her 70s, lying on a bed alongside a man, Jack, widowed like her, and as 'old, big and sagging' as she was. *Olive Again* picks up only 1 month later.

The characters (many of them familiar from earlier books) step into the foreground to star in their own stories, then recede, to be glimpsed much later, their lives having moved on in the meantime. They develop. They change their minds. Olive herself says, tentatively, in one of the stories, that she thinks she may have become a bit nicer, and it's true. She has. She grows old, as few fictional heroines do, while we witness the indignities, terrors and frustrations which go with that process. Her authorial voice is always detached, never moralistic, and the author shows how age has weakened what was most exasperating about Olive – her always-rightness, her irascibility – while leaving her bracing humour intact.





#### Ongar Nature Watch

#### Where have all the butterflies gone?

Once upon a time, butterflies were common in this area, but now we are fortunate if we see a few. As a teenager (yes, I can remember that long ago) nettles abounded with small



tortoiseshell caterpillars along the nearby River Roding. I have not seen them in recent times.

The UK's butterfly population has fallen sharply as they are affected by rising temperatures and fragmented habitats. There are 59-recorded species in Britain, representing those that live in the country year-round as well as two seasonal migrants. So far this year, I have seen fewer butterflies than usual in the garden. There has been the occasional Brimstone, Comma, Small White, Red Admiral, Peacock, Meadow Brown and Common Blue but that's all. It is still early in summer so hopefully their numbers will increase.

Their bright colours ensure that they are one of the most recognised and recorded animals, which makes them a valuable indicator species to show when an ecosystem is under threat.

While the decline is dramatic, we can all help as small changes to our gardens can play a significant role in helping them recover. Buddleia (the butterfly bush) and lavender are particularly attractive to butterflies but remember the food plants for the caterpillars. I have just added nasturtiums in pots to the garden, a favourite food for the caterpillars of Small and Large White butterflies.

The 2022 Red List of British butterflies, published by Butterfly Conservation, classed five more species as threatened this year. However, the list found some cause for optimism, with the Large Blue butterfly, which became extinct in Great Britain just over 40 years ago, now recovering following a successful reintroduction scheme.

Dr Richard Fox, of Butterfly Conservation, says, 'Shockingly, half of Britain's remaining butterfly species are listed as threatened or near threatened on the new Red List. Even prior to this new assessment, British butterflies were among the most threatened in Europe. Butterflies face many pressures, mostly from habitat loss. For example, 80% of chalk grassland has ceased to exist since 1945 with the loss of the rare plants that grow in these soils.'



Dr Blanca Huertas, of the Natural History Museum, says, 'Butterflies are dependent on a specific set of factors in each stage of their lifecycle. As eggs and caterpillars, they are very sensitive to any changes in the microclimate and rely on certain plants. When they are adults, they are often more generalist, but modifying a habitat will take away plants that these butterflies depend on. This affects their ability to survive.'

While butterflies are under threat, the Red List demonstrates that there is the potential for a recovery. Alongside the Large Blue, the High Brown Fritillary and Duke of Burgundy have seen their populations stabilise in recent years.

As well as restoring breeding and feeding habitats, it is also important to ensure connectivity between them. As butterflies cannot travel long distances, this involves providing flower rich field margins that can act as stepping stones to link suitable habitats.


#### Fyfield Festival 2022





## Is your child starting primary school?



# Geoff Letchfield 1932-2022

Paul Blackwell, Geoff's nephew, gave the following eulogy at Geoff's funeral. It sums up Geoff and his life so well, that we asked Paul's permission to share it with you.



Geoff was born on the 4th November 1932 in the family home in Fyfield, to proud parents John & Olive. The eldest of 5 siblings, he was followed by Dave, Olive, Doris, and Paul. At the grand age of 5 Geoff started at the Primary School in Fyfield before moving onto the Ongar Comprehensive School until the permitted leaving age of 14. He left education and started his first job at Ernest Doe & Sons in Fyfield as a trainee mechanic and where, in Geoff's own words, his boss at the time informed him that his tea making skills needed work but he could sweep a good work shop floor!!!! Well, he must have done okay as he became a very skilled mechanic and engineer and was the workshop foreman for Doe Contracts for many years until the closure of the workshop ended his employment. During this time the only interruption in his job at Does was when he was called up to do his National Service where he spent two years in the Royal Artillery Corps.

Following on in his career Geoff then joined Essex County Council and became a Caretaker & Driver at the Elmbridge Boarding School in Fyfield and remained there until his retirement. Now, I'm guessing when I say that there are not many of us who can say they have spent their entire working life in the same small village where they were born?

At the tender age of 14, Geoff was to meet Dod (Dot) who lived close to him in Fyfield and she became the love of his life, they married in Fyfield Church on the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1961 and immediately moved into their first home in the village, at Trelawny Cottages, where they have remained throughout their 61 years of marriage.



Geoff loved sport and over the years participated in cycle speedway, football, occasionally cricket, snooker and, later in life, indoor and outdoor bowls. He was one of the founder members of the Fyfield Carpet Bowls Club, playing in all three disciplines and doing so at a commendable standard winning many awards and trophies.

Throughout his life, Geoff also enjoyed many interests and hobbies and his mechanical and engineering skills would see him restore vintage tractors, ploughs and stationary engines. He would attend events and ploughing matches, showing and competing around the county of Essex and beyond. In addition, one hobby was being a member of the 'Eddie Stobart' Haulage Fan Club and he would spend hours spotting the individual truck names and diligently recording them along with trips to the depots and collecting merchandise.

Throughout many of these events, Dod would be beside him, supporting him and sometimes participating (although I don't remember her ever driving a Tractor & Plough) and they spent many years travelling to Pontins in Norfolk for their summer holidays with Dod's sister Mary and her husband Roy.

But most of all Geoff enjoyed a very fulfilling life, loving the things he was involved in and the people he was able to share it with, none more so than his beloved Dod or 'Eddie' as he would often refer to her. Geoff had nick names for almost everyone, some quite obscure such as my mum Doris or 'Learie' as she is known, which was brought about by her having a full pair of lips as apparently, so I am told, did a cricketer from back in the day whose name was 'Learie Constantine, and that name has remained with her throughout her life...... I'm sure many of us have our own nick names given to us by Geoff which we will remember with great fondness. He was a terrific character whose stories and tales will live on for a long time, some of which we had heard more than just the once! But as you will have noticed, he loved those around him, he was the last born and bred man to have lived and worked in Fyfield his entire life and often referred himself to being "a Fyfield Man Through and Through' his life was surely one which you could easily write a book about,

Geoff you will be sorely missed by us all!
