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
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Further extracts from the Fyfield WI 1975 archive:

Observations

Early in the year, fieldfares and redwings flocked together in Higher Marsh, but in the spring, a fall of snow and high winds finally dislodged one of the many elm trees on the river bank – this along with others, had to be felled because of the elm disease which is now country wide.

However, the house-martins returned on April 19th, followed by the swallows and the cuckoo greeted us with his call on April 27th.





An increased number of ring-doves has been observed this year and, after a beautiful summer, the abundance of luscious blackberries has fortified the blackbirds for the winter.

After a cold, wet spring which delayed sowing and planting, and late frosts which damaged fruit blossom, the summer of 1975 was one of the hottest and driest on record.

One consequence of this was an unusually large number of ladybirds whose presence was welcomed by the gardeners for their help in controlling the green fly. Sadly, the variety of butterflies was much reduced this year.

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Dr Walker's School

It is hard to believe that we are already in the run up to Christmas with so much to report and much still to happen before the Christmas break.



So far this term the whole school has taken part in a Diwali Day with workshops to perform dance, create a Diwali lantern and a tree of wishes; we celebrated Black History Month with the theme of *Standing Firm in Power and Pride*; for Anti-bullying week everyone wore odd socks and Early Years and Year 1 travelled to Margaretting school for a 'People who Help Us' day. They met firefighters, a vet and police officers and had a chance to try on some of the equipment (including handcuffs!) and stroke a guinea pig.

In September there were fund raising days to support Air Ambulance where the

children decorated heart shaped biscuits and took part in the daily mile; closely followed by Macmillan Cancer Support coffee morning, with a cupcake decorating competition. £70 was raised for the Air Ambulance and £55.50 for Macmillan Cancer Support.

In October, we joined thousands of individuals, schools and communities across the country on World Mental Health Day to raise money and show young people that they're not alone with their mental health. The school was turned yellow for "Hello Yellow" Day in order to raise awareness of the issues.

Harvest Festival in St Nicholas' Church saw children and families/carers joining together to give thanks through their Harvest songs, poems and prayers. An impressive Harvest table of donated food items was sent to Harlow Food Bank.

A Remembrance Collective Worship was held on 11/11 and each class held a 2-minute silence at 11am in honour of those who fell in the two world wars. The children were all, without exception, respectful of the meaning of the silence and why the day is marked.



Each child also made a poppy out of old plastic bottle bottoms and these were incorporated into a wreath to display on the front gate. On the same day, a very successful open morning was held with a large number of prospective parents for the September 2026 intake visiting the school to see us in action.

Year 5 children were presented with a wonderful opportunity to apply for the position of a LIFE

Ambassador. They will focus on the principle of 'Ubuntu' - 'I am what I am, because of who we all are' and will represent Dr Walker's along with Ambassadors from the other LIFE Primary Schools. Well done to Eva and Hugo for their successful applications.

Year 5 and 6 had a very exciting and hands-on Viking Day at Cressing Temple Barns where they took part in archery, making a never-ending beast design and putting their own design onto a lozenge, handling Viking artefacts and learning how they were made and finally taking part in a Viking Thing. Viking societies were governed by local assemblies called Things where laws were made and punishments decided on if laws were broken. The children were able to act out scenarios and ultimately banish wrongdoers if their crime warranted it!

Year 1 and 2 have been learning about The Great Fire of London and had a Fire of London Day where they re-told and acted out the story, based on Pepys diary, made art installations using stand-up wooden landmarks of London, made code wheels to crack secret writing and had a science session which involved burning and fire experiments to understand what three elements are needed to create a fire and to extinguish it. Rest assured that the fire was very controlled and was in a wok-sized fireproof pan!

As you can see, it has been a very busy couple of months! And, there is still more to come in the run-up to Christmas; Christmas jumper day, Christmas lunch, Carols in the church, whole school visit to the pantomime, nativity performance and KS2 Christmas production – we will be ready for a break by the end of the term!

The staff and pupils would like to take this opportunity to wish our friends and neighbours in the community a very happy Christmas and a peaceful and healthy New Year.

Remembrance Service at St Nicholas' Church

1st Moreton and Fyfield Scouts

On 7th November 1917, Private Henry Blowes died of his injuries sustained in Ypres at Leicestershire Hospital. This year, 7th November fell on a Friday and to honour the brave servicemen of World War One, 1st Moreton and Fyfield Scouts decided to research in to the life of Henry Blowes.

We learned that he lived at Clatterford End, his brother, James and his cousin Bertie also fought in the war and both lost their lives too. The Scouts decorated stones to commemorate the lives of the brave men from Fyfield who gave their lives during the Great War and laid them at the grave of Henry at the Remembrance Service at St Nicholas Church on Sunday.


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St Nicholas' Church

We'll miss her but here are some happy memories.














Fyfield Focus – December 25/January 26

6th March 1933 – 13th October 2025

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of dear Mary and our thoughts are with Roy and her friends and family. Below are extracts from the tribute read at her funeral by David Fowler, the Funeral Minister, who conducted the service.



Mary was born on 6th March 1933 in Fyfield to parents Jessie and Robert Brittain, and was the eldest of seven children. She lived in the Fyfield area all her life but had to relocate with the family during the Second World War as the runway of the newly built Willingale Airfield took up their garden!

Mary left school a few weeks early to help her mother look after the family after the birth of the youngest child. Subsequently, she worked as a housekeeper for a few years before going on to work in the village shop where she stayed for over fifty years, joined by her sister Dod. It was then a general store, selling everything from shotgun cartridges to wellington boots, and clothing to food and general household items. Many people have fond memories of Mary serving them, especially those who as young children would call in on their way home from school.

As a young woman, Mary used to help provide teas for Fyfield football team. One day, Roy Wilkinson, a recently signed player who had previously played for Abbess Roding, met Mary after the game. Love blossomed and the happy



couple married in February 1963 at St Nicholas Church. They moved into Westholm, a bungalow at Norwood End and have been there ever since.

In the summer Mary became part of the team providing cricket teas for Fyfield's home matches – she made wonderful cakes and apple pies - and it was here that she first met Penny and Paul Ovel who became good friends to Mary and Roy and have been a great support in recent times.

In addition to working in the village shop, Mary also helped out on the farm – planting potatoes, feeding Roy as he drove the tractor and providing refreshments to those attending shooting parties on the farm. She was kind and helpful and a good organiser, with her in charge, everything fell into place.

Mary and Roy enjoyed their holidays which were always in the UK. Pontins at Hemsby on the Norfolk coast being the favourite destination.

In later years the Village Hall became the centre of her social life. Mary helped with the refreshments for Bingo and played carpet bowls. She enjoyed all the events here and she loved a dance. We will hear her favourite dance track (*The Birdie Song by the Tweets*) at the end of this service. When it played, she would jump up out of her seat insisting that everyone joined her on the dance floor!

Mary had enjoyed her life and had been active until quite recently when she suffered a fall and damaged her hip which affected her mobility, but she did her best to carry on with life until she had an accident when she hit her head and was taken to the Princess Alexandra Hospital where she stayed until she passed away.

So we are here today to celebrate her long life. We are shortly going to say our farewells to Mary and entrust her into God's keeping; but as we do so, please hold on to your good memories of Mary and think of the special and precious times you shared with her.

A Tribute to Mary Wilkinson

I first met Mary in 1976, when Paul, my boyfriend at the time, began playing cricket for Fyfield. I was shy back then and would sit in the car while the game went on. It was Mary who came over and gently persuaded me to join her and the other ladies. That simple kindness set the course for a long and treasured friendship.

Mary was at the heart of those cricket afternoons, always busy with the teas, and as time went on, I joined her in helping. Paul became close friends with her husband Roy, and soon the four of us shared many happy times together. Paul would often help Roy on the farm, and I would spend those hours with Mary, who always welcomed us with warmth and delicious dinners.

Mary played an important role in my life. When Paul and I were offered the chance to rent Tannerwhites in Norwood End, she was by my side with advice and encouragement. She even helped with the plans for our wedding in the village hall. I'll never forget arriving from the church to see flowers beautifully arranged on the tables - something I had forgotten completely - but, of course, Mary had quietly taken care of it. That was who she was: thoughtful, reliable, and always thinking of others.

There are so many memories, but one in particular makes me smile even now. One Saturday, while Paul and Roy had gone to Lords to watch cricket, I picked Mary up to go and prepare the cricket teas. As we were chatting away, I misjudged a gateway while turning the car, and suddenly we were looking at the sky, the car teetering on a bank with a pond below. Mary, with her typical directness, shouted, 'You're in the ditch!' We both managed to climb out safely, and with the help of a kind neighbour and a tractor, the car was rescued. In true Mary fashion, she stayed calm and good-humoured throughout - a steady presence even in unexpected moments.

Mary was more than a friend - she was family in every way that mattered. She gave so much of herself to others with kindness, generosity, and quiet strength. I will always treasure the laughter, the meals shared, the gentle guidance, and the countless small gestures of love she gave so freely.

Mary will be deeply missed, but the memories of her warmth and friendship will live in my heart forever

Dennis was a humble, lovely man. He had time for everybody, was gentle, loved his wife, his daughter and son. He was just a great Fyfield man, a gentleman and one that will be missed by many.

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

Fairy Tales from the Brothers Grimm by Philip Pullman.

Reading this month's book gave me quite a few surprises. Number one, the Brothers Grimm didn't actually write the stories at all - they were actually part of a rich oral tradition passed down the generations. The leaves have fallen from the trees, the nights have drawn in and the clocks have gone back. We're now in the countdown to Santa suiting up and preparing to squeeze down chimneys across the country. We have chosen who will get our Christmas food order and moaned about the reduced size of our favourite Christmas chocolates - the same size box for increased money but less volume. Nothing quite says the festive season is upon us like the John Lewis Christmas Advert or the adventures of Aldi's Kevin the Carrot and the dates are out for the iconic Coca-Cola Trucks. Ninety seven percent of the world has heard of Coca-Cola. Seventy two percent of the world has seen a can of Coca-Cola. Fifty one percent has tasted a can of Coca-Cola. 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Ongar Nature Watch

Fungi

This is the time of year when our larger fungi can be seen in fields, woodlands and gardens. Some, like mushrooms, toadstools and puff balls grow on the ground while others, such as bracket fungi, are found on trees.



There are many different kinds of fungi, from toadstools to microscopic yeasts, but all have one thing in common – they lack the green pigment found in other plants and so cannot use sunlight energy to make food from carbon dioxide in the air. Instead, they absorb nutrients from the items on which they grow.

The parts of the toadstools that we see are only a small part of the organism. They are the fruiting bodies, roughly equivalent to the flowers of green plants. The top of the fungus is called the cap and inside are gills, producing millions of tiny spores which are blown about by the wind. If a spore lands in a suitable place it grows and sends out minute tubes, which form a mass of fine threads, called the mycelium. Only when it is well established will it grow the familiar fruiting bodies and produce more spores.

There are many interesting and attractive fungi living in our countryside. The Sulphur Tuft is named for its bright sulphur-yellow caps and gills. It grows on tree stumps and the dead wood of trees and, unlike most fungi, can be seen all year round. Although pretty, the Sulphur Tuft fungus is poisonous, so beware.

Puffballs also grow on rotting wood and the globular fruiting bodies are borne at the ends of long stems. The spores develop inside the fruiting bodies and every time a raindrop strikes them, a puff of spores is released into the air, which explains the name "puffball".

It looks so beautiful and attractive in children's stories with a fairy using it as a stool, but the red and white Fly Agaric, pictured above, is extremely poisonous and, although seldom fatal, if eaten it may cause sickness, diarrhoea, hallucinations, convulsions and coma.

Fungi play an important role in our environment, as recyclers, decomposing dead organisms and returning the resulting nutrients to the soil for plants to reuse. They also provide us with many other benefits in the form of food, anti-

biotic drugs, and in the making of bread, cheese, yoghurt and alcohol. However, they are not always beneficial as fungal infections can lead to a wide variety of diseases in people, animals, and crop plants, and fungal attacks can destroy timber in buildings. Remember that many fungi are poisonous and, unless you are absolutely certain that it is harmless and edible, just look and admire.


