

Further extracts from the Fyfield WI 1975 archive:

Dr. Walker's Church School



This school, endowed by a former rector in 1657, is now under the Essex Education Authority, who have built an Open Plan School on the opposite side of Queen Street to the original building. Here, headmaster David Ellis, with no previous experience of open plan teaching, has made an excellent transition to this system which he finds far more challenging and

worthwhile. It keeps the staff on their toes and co-operating together and the children know all the teachers, so have no worries about moving up under an unknown and perhaps feared teacher. Problems are shared in a family atmosphere and parents are free to come and go and give their help in special activities, sometimes helping with the slow readers. The pupils, who average 80 - 90 in number, are free to move throughout the school and join in any activity except for the first session of the day, which they spend with their allotted teacher.

The school has been visited by students from Brentwood Teacher Training College, Further Education and Technical Colleges, foreign students, schoolchildren and a South African teacher on a university study course. Towards the end of the year, two teachers from the Ongar Comprehensive came to talk to the older children who also spent a day in the Comprehensive School. The children show little self-consciousness and rarely appear to be disturbed by these visits.

The pupils attended church on Ash Wednesday and Ascension Day and, on May 15th and 16th, took part in a Choir Festival at Ongar Comprehensive School.

Despite its small size, Fyfield has done well in the inter-school sports, particularly in netball and football. An Easter Garden competition was held and was judged by Mr David Adlam. Visits were made by the infants to the Natural History Museum and by the older children to Hedingham Castle, after which they produced a book on their visit.



District Matters

Well reader, there doesn't seem to be an evening or daytime TV programme which doesn't mention Epping or the Bell Hotel. One of the residents of the Bell Hotel was arrested and later convicted of assault. Following the arrest there were protests in the streets by local residents and violent far right activists which caused a lot of press coverage. Epping Forest District Council obtained an injunction requiring the hotel residents to be moved out. However, the government and the owners of the hotel appealed and the injunction was set aside. Epping then applied to the Supreme Court to reverse this. At the stage of writing this article nothing is totally clear except there will be a decision made during October. If nothing else EFDC's involvement on behalf of the residents of Epping has made the government speed up a final decision. I'm afraid I can't tell you much more about this at this point in time. To learn more just visit the EFDC website. We are going to give a full update over the next few weeks.

Local government reorganization is a big topic of the moment which I have mentioned a few times before. As yet, nothing has been decided but there should be some movement during September/October. Once again if you wish to keep up to date on this please go to the EFDC website for further information. In the meantime, have a good October and November.







In August the world marked the 80th anniversary of the ending of the war with Japan; the first, and last time, nuclear weapons were used in conflict. We are now approaching Remembrance Day in the UK when we reflect on the dead of all wars. Unfortunately, conflict continues in many parts of the world, and it is easy to feel depressed and powerless to help. For much of history warfare appears to have been the norm. The tradition of shaking hands when meeting people is truly ancient and shows peaceful intent as it makes it clear you have no weapon. Castles and fortifications are scattered throughout Europe. Lords and chieftains were constantly at war. Ordinary people suffered greatly and were wary of strangers. Today, you can still see remnants of fortified farms in France and walls were built around towns with gates being locked and guarded at night. The narrow part of the road going into Ongar is where the town gate once stood with the castle close by. Peace is a great blessing. It allowed people to plant and harvest crops and keep their family safe.

One of the reasons that King Alfred had the moniker 'The Great' is because people could travel safely during his reign as it was so peaceful in his kingdom. It is interesting how many times 'peace' is mentioned in scripture. In the nativity scene the angel says, 'peace on earth and goodwill to all men'. During the Catholic Mass we share the 'sign of peace' a handshake or a nod to those around us. This reminds us of Jesus's words to the apostles 'my peace I leave with you; my peace I give unto you'. To live in peace is what we all desire. 'Peace be with you' is a traditional greeting in many cultures. We hope and pray that all may enjoy it.



Ongar Nature Watch

Kestrels and Sparrow Hawks



Kestrels and sparrow hawks are both birds of prey, so called because they hunt animals on the wing, using their keen sense of sight. They are equipped with strong, sharp claws called talons, and large, powerful beaks adapted for tearing and piercing flesh. They are also referred to as raptors, a term derived from Latin meaning to seize or overcome by force.

Although both kestrels and sparrow hawks are predators, they hunt in completely different ways.

The kestrel is a familiar sight all year round in this area, hovering some 10 metres or so above roadside verges with wings quivering and tail widespread, methodically searching the ground below for prey. When not in flight they may look for their small mammal and bird prey whilst perched on a branch high in a tree and on a telephone post or wire. Kestrels are attractive birds and have brownish upperparts, the male being more red with a blue-grey head and tail. In most cases, the females are considerably larger than the males.

Intensive management of farmland and habitat change have made kestrels less common over recent decades. However, man-made environments including motorway verges have come to their rescue and kestrels may now be found in urban as well as rural areas.

Kestrels often nest in church towers, old buildings and hollow trees, and sometimes they reuse deserted nests of other birds such as crows and magpies. The single clutch contains 3 to 6 eggs, white or yellowish-buff with red-brown markings.

Sparrowhawks are small birds of prey. They are adapted to hunt birds in confined spaces like dense woodland, so gardens are ideal hunting grounds. Male sparrowhawks have a slate grey back and white underparts, barred with orange. Females are larger and have brown upperparts and dark barring underneath. They have broad, rounded wings and a long tail and are perfectly adapted for weaving in and out of trees at high speed in pursuit of small birds on which they feed.



The quarry is eaten on the ground, the hawk standing with both feet on its victim; wings drooped to form a tent to prevent other birds of prey sharing its catch. They may be seen soaring high in the sky, but unlike kestrels, they never hover.

Sparrowhawks build their nests, a simple platform made from twigs, in trees and this is used to raise a single clutch of 2-7 eggs each year. The eggs are bluish-white with dark brown markings and, like kestrels, incubation is by the female only although both adults feed the young.

Ongar Wildlife Society (OWLS)

With the climate changing so dramatically, wildlife globally and locally is being affected significantly. In order to follow these effects on animals and plants, we rely on biologists with in-depth knowledge of our fauna and flora to keep us informed of the current situation. A good way to keep updated is to converse with local experts.



Ongar Wildlife Society has access to such experts and invites them to talk to members in manageable groups where questions can be asked and discussions held. Sessions take the form of afternoon illustrated talks, which have been held for decades. The talks continue at 2pm on 20th October with *Wildlife of Costa Rica*.

Visitors pay just £5 to hear a talk but you can become a member for an annual fee of only £25, covering all of the monthly meetings.
