## Valentine's Day - A potted history

We all know that Valentine's Day is a celebration of romance and love. However, the origins of this day are not quite so loving! It is widely believed that the name comes from a Roman priest in the third century AD. Emperor Claudius II had outlawed marriage as he believed single men without a wife or family were better soldiers. The priest, Valentine, thought this was unfair and so performed marriages in secret and was imprisoned for his actions. In this popular story it is said that Valentine fell in love with the daughter of his jailer and he signed a letter to her 'from your Valentine'. Later



Valentine was executed for his beliefs on 14th February. In 496AD, Pope Gelasius I canonised Valentine and decreed that his Saint's Day should be honoured on 14th February to detract from the old Roman feast days.

The association between Saint Valentine's Day and lovers is the fault of one Geoffrey Chaucer (c. 1340–1400). In his late 14th-century comic dreamvision, the *Parliament of Fowls*, he describes a group of birds who gather together in the early spring – on 'seynt valentynes day' – to choose their mates for the year. Some scholars have suggested that the poem was written for King Richard II (1367–1400) during the negotiations over his marriage to Anne of Bohemia in 1380. This theme was taken up by Charles, Duke of Orleans whose love letter to his wife written on 14th February 1415 while he was a prisoner in the Tower of London after the battle of Agincourt, is the first known Valentine letter. It is now in the British Museum.

As the years went on, the holiday grew sweeter. It is believed that in the Middle Ages, young men and women would choose names from a bowl, and this name would be their Valentine, which they would wear on their sleeves. Shakespeare romanticised it in his works, and it gained popularity throughout Britain and the rest of Europe.

It had long been the tradition on Valentine's Day to give and receive gifts, but it wasn't until much later that greetings cards were introduced, and the tradition of the anonymous Valentine's card or note became customary. In 1797, a British publisher issued *The Young Man's Valentine Writer*, which contained scores of suggested sentimental verses for the young lover unable to compose his own. Printers had already begun producing a limited number of cards with verses and sketches, called 'mechanical Valentines'. Paper Valentines became so popular in England in the early 19th century that they were assembled in factories.



In Victorian England, the cards were incredibly delicate, with lace paper and ribbons often with hidden panels which housed secret notes.

In 1835, 60,000 Valentine cards were sent by post in the United Kingdom, despite postage being expensive.

Since the 19th century, handmade cards have given way to mass-produced greeting cards. In the UK, just under half of the population spend money on their Valentines, and

around £1.9 billion was spent in 2015 on cards, flowers, chocolates, and other gifts.

#### X - the kiss

The tradition of the 'X' sign representing a kiss started with the Medieval practice of allowing those who could not write to sign documents with an 'X'. This was done before witnesses, and the signer placed a kiss upon the 'X' to show sincerity. This is how the kiss came to be synonymous with the letter 'X', and how it came to be commonly used at the end of letters as a kiss symbol.



Since the human heart has long been associated with emotion and pleasure, the shape was eventually co-opted as a symbol of romance and medieval courtly love. It grew especially popular during the Renaissance, when it was used in religious art depicting the Sacred Heart of Christ and as one of the four suits in playing cards. By the 18th and 19th centuries, meanwhile, it had become a recurring motif in love notes and Valentine's Day cards.



Roses are associated with love primarily because of their connection to Aphrodite, the Greek goddess of love, in mythology; stories often depict her being closely linked to the rose, with the red colour of the rose often symbolizing her blood, which stained the petals when she injured herself on a thorn while rushing to her lover Adonis' side; this association with love and beauty carried through to Roman mythology where Venus, the equivalent of Aphrodite, was also linked to the rose.


## February Days by Ellwood Roberts



#### **March Madness**



March is named after Mars, the Roman god of war, and symbolizes the beginning of spring and new beginnings in many cultures.

The first day of March is the Welsh celebration of St. David's Day. So pick your daffodils, the flower of March, and eat some leeks!



Ramadan is the ninth month of the Islamic calendar and this year almost exactly matches March starting on the 1<sup>st</sup> and ending on the 29<sup>th</sup>. It is observed by Muslims worldwide as a month of fasting, prayer, reflection, and community.

March 8th is a day of empowerment and celebration - International Women's Day.

The expression "mad as a March hare" refers to wild and unpredictable behaviour, often applied to anyone, human or animal. It is now thought that hares 'boxing' are unreceptive females using their forelegs to repel amorous males early in the season!

Holi, the Hindu festival of colours, love and spring is on 10<sup>th</sup> March this year. It celebrates the eternal and divine love of the deities Radha and Krishna and signifies the triumph of good over evil.

March 44 BC saw a major power play by Julius Caesar. With a stroke of his pen, he added ten days to the year and shifted the start of the year from the end of March to January 1st, cementing his place in history as a ruler who not only conquered lands but also manipulated the very fabric of time.

But March 15th, the Ides of March made famous by Shakespeare's Julius Caesar, saw his assassination and a warning against betrayal.

March 17th marks St. Patrick's Day, a global celebration of all things green and Irish. St. Patrick was an Englishman captured by Irish pirates from his home and credited with introducing Christianity to Ireland in the fifth century.



As I write this article for the January deadline, we are experiencing a bout of wintry weather so it seems very apt to be writing about a Christian festival which has its roots in a pagan holiday celebrated in the Northern Hemisphere to mark the midpoint of winter. Candlemas is exactly halfway between the Winter Solstice on December 21st and the Spring Equinox on March 20th and was a celebration of light as the days got longer and the worst of the winter weather was hopefully over.

The feast of Candlemas is celebrated in the Christian calendar on February 2nd and commemorates the 'Light of Christ' being brought into the world by his mother when she presented Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem forty days after his birth. 

### **Ongar Nature Watch**

#### The Robin

The robin is many people's favourite and has been adopted as Britain's National Bird. Its orange-red face, throat and breast make identification easy but robins can be recognised even in silhouette or at twilight by their plump shape, upright stance and sudden movements.



Males and females are identical but young birds are golden brown and distinctly speckled.

Robins may be seen around gardens, in woodland, hedgerows and parks searching for insects and earthworms in the warmer months, fruit, and berries in winter. Please remember that their food is in short supply now so offer them something to eat to survive the cold winter. Fat balls, seeds, suet pellets and mealworms are all appreciated by robins and other birds.

In the warmer months, robins also perform acrobatic flights to catch insects on the wing.

You may hear them all year round and at all times of the day, and they will even sing at night if perched next to a street light.

Despite their cute appearance, they are aggressively territorial and are quick to attack other robins and drive them away.

In wintertime both males and females occupy their own territories and, to defend them, the females sing and display just like males. In spring, the females have to convince the males to stop fighting and start co-operating in raising a family. To do this, when they encroach into the males' territories, they behave like young birds begging for food.

After successful pairing, the female robin produces a clutch of 4 - 5 white or pale blue eggs marked with reddish spots. In March the first clutch is laid and up to two more clutches in the following months. Incubation is by the female only but the young are fed by both parents. The typical lifespan is around two years, although the maximum recorded age is over 8 years.

Robins are well adapted to life in this country as shown by the number of breeding pairs, estimated to be around six million. British robins are mostly sedentary although a few migrate to Spain and Portugal for the winter. In addition, large numbers from northern Europe overwinter here while others pass through Britain before continuing to spend the winter in Iberia and northern Africa. These migrants can be recognized by their greyer bodies and duller orange breasts. Robins from northern Europe are woodland birds and do not frequent parks and gardens in Britain, which makes them shyer birds than their British cousins.

Christmas cards would not be the same without the robin. A possible explanation is that when early Christmas cards were produced in the mid-18th Century, they were delivered by postmen wearing bright red coats. The postmen became known as 'Robins' or 'Redbreasts', and the bird on the Christmas card represented the postman who delivered it.

The robin is often known as Cock Robin, a name that originates from an old English folk tale entitled *The Marriage of Cock Robin and Jenny Wren* together with a nursery rhyme called *Who Killed Cock Robin?* To remind you of it, here are the first and last verses:

Who killed Cock Robin? I, said the Sparrow, With my bow and arrow, I killed Cock Robin.

All the birds of the air Fell a-sighing and a-sobbing, When they heard the bell toll For poor Cock Robin.



The rhyme is thought to refer to the death of the legendary Robin Hood. The words describe how help was offered from all quarters following the death of cock robin and may reflect the high esteem in which Robin Hood was held by common folk. Another explanation is that the rhyme refers to the fall of the government of Robert Walpole in 1742, for Robin is a diminutive of Robert and the first printing of the poem can be traced to about that time.
